News of his death comes as a) great shock. Mr. Pater had been i in ill health for several years, but had seemingly benefited greatly from his sojourn in the South until he was stricken with 1 influenza several days ago. He was hospitalized and despite the p best of care failed to rally. Notified of his serious condition, Mr. Pater's son, Vincent, Jr., and ¹ his brother, Clem, Jr., made a S hurried trip to Florida and were r with him when he died.

Sorin hall of George Gipp, Notre Dame's football immortal and one of the all-time greats of American intercollegiate football.

Throughout the years Mr. Fater's interest and devotion to Notre Daine never flagged. He was president, at the time of his death, of the Notre Dame club of Hamilton, an organization which he, with the late Judge M. O. Burns, was instrumental in forming.

Many Hamilton young men who have matriculated at Notre Dame have matriculated at Notre Dane, owed their decision to attend the South Bend school to the spirited interest Mr. Pater showed in his alma mater. Frequently executives of the university expressed their appreciation to Mr. Pater for his continued work in behalf of the school.

An ardent follower of the school's football teams, Mr. Pater made it an annual custom to attend several of the big games. Began Practice

Immediately upon his graduation from Notre Dame, he began the practice of law in his native city, a profession in which he was eminently successful, gaining a wide reputation throughout the wide reputation throughout the community as a trial lawyer. His brother, Clement Pater, Jr., later became associated with him. The integrity of Mr. Pater was unquestioned, and he had the respect of all who knew him. Mr. Pater Pater served as president of the Butler County Bar association for the 1940-41 term.

Until his health began to fail, he was prominently identified with community, civic and church affairs, and active in Father But-ler council No. 968, Knights of (Continued On Page 14).
