Clem Pater Sr. Expires; Shoe Merchant Was 95

Clem Pater Sr., 95, formerly of 902 Harrison Ave., a mem-ber of one of Hamilton's oldest and most prominent families, died at 3:25 a. m. Saturday in the Hillandale Rest Home, 4195 Hamilton-Mason Rd., where he had been a patient for several months. Mr. Pater had been in failing health for a number of years.

He was born in Hamilton on July 8, 1869, the son of B. H. and Catherine Holbrock Pater, a pioneer business family in this community. Mr. Pater was educated in St. Joseph School and was a lifelong member of St. Joseph Church.

He married Cecilia H. Benzinger on Sept. 13, 1893, in Covington, Ky., in St. Benedict Church, and the devoted couple enjoyed more than 71 years of marriage - one of the longest and most successful marriages of this century in Hamilton, Mrs. Pater is a patient in a local nursing home.
