Jenny Erpenbeck, homemaker, helped decorate model homes

Jenny L. Erpenbeck enjoyed being a homemaker and spending time with her three small children.

"She loved to have people over and cook out and she enjoyed her home," said her father-in-law, Tony Erpenbeck. "She basically just liked being with the kids."

Mrs. Erpenbeck, 30, of Edgewood, died Tuesday of cancer in Omaha, Neb., where she was receiving treatments after a bone marrow transplant three weeks ago.

Mrs. Erpenbeck helped decorate the models in the Farmview and Hergott Estates subdivisions built by the

"She enjoyed helping her husband in the sale of the new homes," her father-in-law said. "She had kind of a talent for colors. She was just very good at it. Everybody always seemed to like her home, so she would talk to them about different decorating ideas."

Mrs. Erpenbeck grew up in Edgewood and had known her husband, Bill, since elementary school. They were married 10 years ago. She was a graduate of Notre Dame Academy.

She was a member of St. Pius X Church, Edgewood, and Summit Hills Country Club, Crestview Hills.

"She was a good tennis player and swimmer," Tony Erpenbeck said. "But, she was mostly a homemaker and she loved to play with the kids."

Survivors include her husband, Bill Erpenbeck; sons, Tony Erpenbeck, 5, Matthew Erpenbeck, 10 months old, and a daughter, Amanda Erpenbeck, 4, all at home; her parents, Walter and Dorothy Krebs of Edgewood; brothers, John Krebs of Cleveland, Jay Krebs and Jimmy

Krebs, both of Edgewood; and sisters, Theresa Krebs of Southgate and Tracy Krebs of Edgewood.

Mass of Christian burial will be at 10 a.m. Saturday at St. Pius X Church. Visitation will be from 5 to 9 p.m. Friday at Linne mann Funeral Home, Edgewood.
