JOE ARNOLD ANSWERS CALL

Stricken Monday Morning Near Pump House; Was Wellknown Stock Trader.

RETIRED FARMER

Joe Arnold, 76 years old, prominent retired farmer and stock trader, dropped dead early Monday morning, January 30, 1933, near the Cynthiana Water Works plant, of a heart attack. He was on his way to the Cynthiana Livestock Yards and had stopped at the pump house to talk witin Quince Ecklar After finishing the conversation Mr. Arnold started away and had taken one or two steps when he stumbled backward falling into Mr. Ecklar's arms. He was taken into the building at the plant but died before a physician could reach him. The body was removed to the Smith-Rees Home and later taken to the Arnold home on Parkland Heights.

Mr. Arnold suffered a severe attack of influenza a short time ago but had apparently recovered and Monday morning had remarket to his wife that he had slept well and was "feeling fine."

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence on Parkland Heights, Dr. W. P. Fryman officiating. Burial in Battle Grove cemetery. Pall bearers W. R. Curle, S. F. Sprake, M. C. Swinford, D. N. Rees, George Martin and Frank pall bearers, Lebus. Honorary Joan S. Linehan, Joe Costello, L. C. McLoney, Wray Tucker, 1 Brent Hayes, Albert Coson, Daniel Durbin, Sid Martin, Jas. T. Rees, W. E. Hayes, D. C. Cleveland and D. R. Kimbrough.

Mr. Arnold was born in this county February 2, 1858, a son of the late Smith and Nancy Arnold, pioneer settlers of the county. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Sarah Mullen Arnold, a daughter, Mrs. Desha Whiteker, Sunrise; two sons, Wood Arnold, Sunrise, and Harry Arnold, Mc-Kinneysburg, and a sister, Mrs. W. O. Mullen, Cynthiana.

"Uncle Joe" as he was known to every person in Harrison county and to many throughout tentral Kentucky was one of the best known stock traders in this section of the state. For many years he farmed on the Arnold homestead at Sunrise but at the same time engaged extensively in live stock trading, a vocation which he followed during his entire life and he virtually died in the harness as he was on his way to the stock sales when stricken. He was an expert judge of live stock and an authority on prices.

He was also one of the most active members of the Democratic party and rendered valuable aid in every campaign. He never sought public office of any kind, being content to work in the ranks for the good of the party. He had been a member of the Harrison County Democratic Committee for many years and was also one of the county's election commissioners.
